Bangladesh: Update on nipah virus infection

A report from the Institute of Epidemiology, Disease Control and Research revealed that there were 24 Nipah cases were identified among them 21 died with mortality rate of 88%. These cases are from 14 districts (Gaibandha, Natore, Rajshahi, Naogaon, Rajbari, Pabna, Jhenaidah, Mymensingh, Nilphamari, Chittagong, Kurigram, Kustia, Magura, Manikganj). Age distribution of cases are 8 months to 60 years among them 15 are male and 9 are female.

Bangladesh: First human bird flu death

Bangladesh on Sunday confirmed its first bird flu-related death in five years after the H5N1 human infection was detected in the country. The government's disease monitoring arm, Institute of Epidemiology, Disease Control and Research (IEDCR) disclosed the death after it could 'reconfirm' the victim's sample as testing 'positive' at the US Centre for Disease Control and Prevention.

Nepal: Bird flu in Chitwan

After weeks of dithering, bird flu has been finally confirmed at a Gauriganj poultry farm in Bharatpur, Chitwan. It was owned by Pratap Thapa. According to Dr Bodhraj Adhikari of the National Bird Disease Research Laboratory, a rapid response team yesterday night culled over 2,000 fowls following the confirmation of H5N1 virus and more than 100 crates of eggs and hundreds of kilograms of chicken feed were destroyed.
